# a thriller writer

IT'S A homecoming after 30 years for Mukul Deva, who is country's first military thriller writer.

Mukul was born in Lucknow in 1961 and went to La Martiniere College before he joined the National Defence Academy, Pune. Mukul was in Lucknow on Tuesday for a book reading session of his latest thriller *Salim Must Die*.

Mukul has been a jack of many trades — an army guy, an entrepreneur and writer. He took premature retirement from the Indian Army as a Major after serving for 15 years. He said, "All these (professions) cater to different needs, like writing is catharsis for me and business helps me run a family. I run my NGO CANASSIST because I feel that every one has a social responsibility." "I joined the army because I was told that you don't have to study to be in the Army. I have been able to juggle between so many different professions

because of three factors—the discipline that Army inculcated in me, confidence that school instilled in me and the values that my mother infused in me.

Mukul read excerpts from his book *Salim Must Die* at Universal Booksellers, Gomti Nagar. This book is a

sequel to Mukul's book *Lashkar*, which is a riveting, high-pitched action thriller, racing straight into the heart of terror and counter-terror. *Salim Must Die* is set in ten countries and talks about global terrorism.

I think it was an American author who'd written *Heat* - you can never go home again. Sometimes I want to believe that - his feeling was that when I got off the plane at Amma's Airport - in a moment I knew I was home again. Despite the passage of 30 odd years, everything came rushing back to me. I think he had a hunch that he had to go home - it was all about returning and fresh. He had a long journey for the 16 years from the time when I left Lucknow to when I came back - to this 48-year old my dear old home. SALIM MUST DIE! And it's great to be back. Thank you for the book! MUKUL LEFT Lucknow 30 years back but remembers everything about the city. He said, "Lucknow is bigger, better, with wider roads, taller buildings and more people. It's like a homecoming for me. I had never thought I'd come back. My family is now based out of Lucknow, and I had no reason to come back. As soon as we (my taxi driver and I) hit the Vidhan Sabha it all came rushing back to me. I directed the taxi driver to take me to River Bank Colony (the place I am putting up at)." Mukul recalled his days in Lucknow when he and his friends went to Mayfair to watch movies. He said, "We always bought the front row tickets for 25 paise. The reason: when these movies showed songs, people threw coins at the screen and we used to rush to collect those coins. This money was an extra pocket money for us."
